The major space in the new 17,500-square-foot Student Life Center at Archmere Academy serves two functions—a dining room for daily cafeteria service and a worship space for the entire student body for use on special occasions. These two uses required that the space be both flexible and dignified in appearance, with lighting control that is adjustable in mood.

The building's location on the campus creates an edge along the campus, enclosing a new landscaped quadrangle that replaces a former parking lot and dominates the view from inside the new facility. A covered colonnade flanks the front of the building, visually and physically connecting the main classroom building to the two gyms. To maintain and promote a pedestrian environment around the academic core, vehicles were re-routed to new perimeter parking lots throughout the campus.

Also found in the Student Life Center are spaces for college counseling, guidance, and health and food service. A new main office and visitor entrance to the campus anchor one end and create a gateway to the campus. Moving these
